State Law Preemption

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- In 2019, the Florida legislature enacted Section 163.045, Florida Statutes
- prohibits local governments from requiring notices, applications, approvals, permits, fees or mitigation for the pruning, trimming, or removal of trees on *residential* property if a property owner obtains documentation from an arborist certified by the International Society of Arboriculture or a Florida licensed landscape architect that the tree presents a danger to persons or property
- In Cocoa permits are currently not required for tree removal and land clearing for already-developed, single-family or duplex lots

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- proposed ordinance is intended only to define "residential property" for purposes of s. 163.045, F.S.
- "residential property" is proposed to be defined as property with a fully-constructed single-family home or duplex used for residential purposes
 - does not include multi-family residential property, common areas owned by a homeowners' or condominium association, vacant land zoned or designated residential or mixed-use



- 1. Save the trees
- 2. Replace the trees
- 3. Pay into the Arbor Mitigation Fund







- 1. Tree Replacement Standards: newly planted trees, in sum, are equivalent to the d.b.h. of the tree(s) removed
- 2. Size and Number of Replacement Trees: Replacement trees shall have a minimum d.b.h., depending upon the diameter of the tree removed

Diameter of existing Tree (Inches)	Minimum caliper (Inches) of each replacement tree	
4-11	<u>3</u>	
<u>12—17</u>	<u>3</u>	
<u>18—23</u>	4	
<u>24—29</u>	4	
<u>>30</u>	<u>6</u>	FLORIDA

- Right Tree, Right Place: same species as removed or trees listed on the UF/IFAS Florida-Friendly Plant Selection and Design List.
- 2. Tree Replacement Credits for Preserved Trees: 100% of the d.b.h of the tree preserved that is greater than 42" will be credited to reduce the number of replacement inches required

Arbor Mitigation Fund

- Established to provide an option to make a fee payment to the City in lieu of providing the required replacement trees on site
- City of Cocoa general fund, but reserved exclusively for
 - design, acquisition, installation and maintenance of trees
 - the funding of studies related to the City's tree canopy
 - the operation and maintenance of a public tree nursery



Relationship and consistency with Comprehensive Plan Policies and Objectives

Objective 12.1.6: Hydrology, Vegetation, and Wildlife. Protect and conserve soils and native vegetation communities, and maintain the natural functions of the City's ecological zones in a manner consistent with the Goals, Objectives and Policies of the Future Land Use Element.



Recommendations

Staff recommends that City Council **approve** Ordinance No. 12-2020, amending land clearing and tree protection, replacement standards and creating an arbor mitigation fund.
